
Direct speech

 Direct or quoted speech is a sentence that reports speech or thought in its original form, as phrased by the original speaker. It is usually enclosed in quotation marks.



Direct speech

- Examples:
- "I love tacos" she said.
- "I'm happy to see you"
 Jace said.
- Anna said "I've seen a film at the cinema recently"
- We said "We love you"



Reported speech

 Reported speech is often also called indirect speech. When we use reported speech, we are usually talking about the past (because obviously the person who spoke originally spoke in the past). We do not use exact words of the speaker. We just report what he said.





Reported speech

- Examples:
- He said "Jane is sleeping" He said (that) Jane was sleeping.
- Tom said "It may rain" Tom said (that) it might rain.



Direct speech

- When we use direct speech, we use:
- Present simple
- Present continuous
- Past simple




Reported speech

- When we report somebody else's words, the tense of the verb usually changes. We use:
- Past simple
- Past continuous
- Past perfect



Direct and Indirect speech

- The tense of the verb changes:
- Present simple Past simple
- Present continuous Past continuous
- Past simple Past perfect



Tense Changes When I	Using Reported Speech
Direct Speech	Indirect Speech
Present simple Tense	Past simple Tense
Present continuous Tense	Past continuous Tense
Past simple Tense	Past perfect Tense
Past Continuous Tense	Past Perfect Continuous Tense
Present perfect Tense	Past perfect Tense
Future simple Tense (will)	Future in past forms Tense (would)
Can	Could
Мау	Might
Shall	Should
Must	Had to
